Lumps and bumps


Lumps and bumps can grow from different tissue within the body. These 'lumps or bumps' can be fibrous, fatty or sebaceous, which is a blocked hair follicle. Some people are more prone to developing them and can have several which need removing.

Any tissue which has been removed will be sent to the pathology department for examination and the results will be given to you at a later date.

The operation site needs to be kept clean and dry. Please leave your dressing

intact and follow the instructions written below. It is quite normal to notice some bruising around the operation site.

 When can you bath / shower You may experience some mild to moderate pain, this can be relieved by taking painkillers. If on discharge you are given 3 – 5 days supply of painkillers, these may be taken as prescribed, otherwise paracetamol or similar pain relieving medication is appropriate.
