# Toenail Surgery

### **Toenail surgery**

The surgery that has been planned for you is:	

- **-Wedge section** is where a piece of nail and tissue is removed. A stitch may be used to bring the edges of the skin together, where the piece of nail was removed.
- **-Abalation** of nail bed with *phenol*. This is similar to a wedge section but phenol, a disinfectant, is applied into the space where the nail was removed to promote healing.
- **-Zadeks** procedure may be a combination of both of the above. The toenail is completely or partially removed and phenol may be applied. A stitch is often placed in each corner of the old toenail bed.

### Post-operative discharge advice

Your stitches
The operation site needs to be kept clean and dry. Please leave your dressings intact and follow the instructions written below.
When can you bath/shower?

You may experience some moderate pain. This can be relieved by taking painkillers. It is advisable to have a supply of paracetamol and ibuprofen at home.

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Putting you first

After toenail surgery there is a tendency for bleeding to occur. If this should happen to your toe when at home, apply moderate pressure to your toe and raise your foot up on a pillow. If the bleeding does not stop within  $\frac{1}{2}$  - 1 hour, contact your GP.

Some swelling is to be expected in your toe and foot. When resting raise your foot up on a pillow or stool to help reduce this swelling.

At assessment you will have been advised to wear a large slipper or open toe sandal, these can now be worn and will help to relieve pressure on your toes when walking.

#### Contact your GP or GP out-of-hours service if:

- you experience severe pain.

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• your wound becomes red, hot and swollen as this may indicate an infection.
