## **Grommets (Adult)**

# Grommets (adults) What are they?

They are tiny ventilation tubes which are inserted into the middle ear, to help drainage of ear fluid and improvement of hearing.

Once inserted, they remain in the ear for approximately 10 months, when they are gradually pushed out, which you may not even notice. Occasionally they need to be removed under general anaesthetic by an ENT (ear, nose and throat) surgeon.

## Following your surgery Post-operative discharge advice

- •You may notice an improvement to your hearing immediately.
- •If you should experience any mild to moderate pain, paracetamol or similar medication is appropriate.
- •You may experience a small amount of blood stained / waxy discharge from your ears for a few days following the surgery.
- •Try to avoid getting water into your ears. When washing hair, place a piece of Vaseline covered cotton wool inside to protect and keep the ears dry.
- You may recommence swimming after 2 weeks, however, do not jump, dive, or swim under water until your ears have been checked at the outpatient's follow-up appointment.

Outpatient appointment in 2-3 months, this will be sent to you.
You should be able to return to work 2 - 3 days after your operation.
