## Lumps and bumps in the groin area

Lumps and bumps in the groin area can grow from different tissue within the body. These lumps or bumps can be fibrous, fatty or sebaceous (a blocked hair follicle). Some people are more prone to developing them and can have several which need removing.

Any tissue which has been removed will be sent to the Pathology department for examination and the results will be given to you at a later date.

Following your surgery  Stitches							
•	Skin glue will fall away in $7-10$ days. Do not pick or rub it off but allow it to come away naturally.						
•	Steristrips will fall away in 7-10 days. If not you can gently remove them.						
•	The operation site needs to be kept clean and dry. Please leave your dressing intact and follow the instructions written below.						

 A small amount of swelling and bruising is normal; to help relieve this you may be asked to wear a scrotal support or fitted underwear for up to one week. A folded handkerchief placed inside the support will help with comfort; spare supports can be purchased from your local pharmacy.

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Putting you first

- You may experience some pain. This can be relieved by taking painkillers. If on discharge you are given 3 - 5 days supply of painkillers, these may be taken as prescribed; otherwise paracetamol or similar pain relieving medication is appropriate.
- It is important to keep the wound clean and dry, after 24 hours daily baths or showers are recommended.
