Martin Corke Day Surgery Unit

The surgery that has been planned for you to have as a day case is:

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Following your surgery

You may experience some mild to moderate pain. This can be relieved by taking painkillers. If on discharge you are given 3 - 5 days' supply of painkillers, these may be taken as prescribed; otherwise, paracetamol or similar pain-relieving medication is appropriate (see separate pain information leaflet).

Should any bleeding occur, apply moderate pressure and elevate your foot.

Please leave any dressing intact. The operation site needs to be kept clean and dry until the stitches are removed.

Your wound will be reviewed approximately 2 weeks after your surgery and any stitches will be removed as necessary.

You may experience some swelling in your toes and foot; this is normal. It is important to keep your foot elevated on a stool / sofa or on a pillow when in bed, for 48 hours.

To help prevent swelling and stiffness you can gently rotate your foot and ankle and wriggle your toes.

These are some exercises you can do to help prevent swelling and stiffness:

- Gently rotate your foot and ankle
- Gently wriggle your toes

Contact your GP or GP out-of-hours service if:

- You experience severe pain.
- Any bleeding does not stop by the suggested method.
- Your wound becomes red, hot and/or produces a discharge, you may have an infection.
