Can I still have a blood clot (DVT)?

There is a very low risk of DVT in patients who have been assessed however you should look out for:

- Increased swelling of the affected arm/leg
- Increased pain in affected arm/leg
- · Pain or tenderness along the length of vein in the affected arm/leg

If your symptoms do not resolve or increase in severity, please return to your GP or Accident and Emergency department.

Attend Accident and Emergency **URGENTLY** if you develop any of the following symptoms:

- 1. Sudden onset of breathlessness that is unusual for you
- 2. Chest and/or back pain that is unusual for you

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- 3. Coughing up blood (Haemoptysis)
- 4. Fast heart rate, racing pulse or palpitations
- 5. Episode of collapse

Advise the A&E staff you have recently been investigated for a DVT.

To reduce your future risk of DVT ensure you keep as active as possible, maintain adequate hydration.
