# Children's Community Occupational Therapy

We enable children and young people who have difficulties or a disability affecting their participation in daily activities and education.

#### Who are we?

Occupational therapists qualified and registered with the Health Care and Professions Council (HCPC) with specialist knowledge of children's conditions and development. Technical Instructors and occupational therapy students who work under the supervision of the occupational therapists.

#### What do we do?

We provide assessment, advice, and intervention so children from birth to 19 years can participate safely, and as fully as possible in activities of daily life. We work closely with other NHS therapy services, Education, Social Care, and other care providers to ensure that children receive the support they need.

#### Who do we see?

Children with physical and neurological impairment including:

- cerebral palsy; neuromuscular conditions; genetic conditions affecting motor development
- babies on the Neonatal Units and children in Ipswich Hospital
- children with functional difficulties
- children with sensory processing differences
- children with motor-coordination and functional difficulties affecting their daily activities.

## We do not accept referrals for:

- School-age children with functional difficulties that are in line with their age and general level of development.
- School-age children whose difficulty relates to emotional and/or behavioural problems.
- Children with co-ordination difficulties in Year Eight and above.
- Children where home adaptations are needed these should be directed to Social Services.

## How long will my child wait to be seen?

We aim to see all children for initial assessment within 18 weeks of an accepted referral.

## Where will my child be seen?

We work in various settings - nurseries, pre-schools, schools, special schools, and home.

## What will happen at the appointment?

Informed consent will be sought for assessment and treatment at all stages of your child/young person's involvement with the service. An adult with parental responsibility is expected to attend the first appointment.

The occupational therapist will explain the role of an occupational therapist and discuss your concerns. Occupation is all the activities we do in our daily lives. The role of Occupational Therapy (OT) is to enable people to do the occupations they want to, need to, or are expected to do.

Our focus is on function and independence and fine motor skills. We will look at participation in activities, strengths, and challenges, and identify agreed goals. These will usually be reviewed at future appointments.

When there are no further identified functional difficulties to work on your child may be discharged from our service; they can be referred to us if further issues arise. Some children require intervention from us throughout their lives.

We may prescribe specialist equipment to assist with daily living tasks and postural management.

## Policy for missed appointments

We ask that if you are unable to attend appointments that you contact the service as early as possible to cancel or rearrange. If you do not do so, we may discharge your child back to the referrer. We use SMS Text Messaging and Email service to

communicate with you; to use this we require your consent. Please ensure that we always have your correct contact details.
